On Saturday, March 10th at Sea Bowl in Pacifica, California, Michael's Mom, Traci drove Michael and his 12 year old brother Darren to bowl in the Daly City All Stars Scratch Trios League.

Michael and Darren were fooling around as usual about which brother was going to beat the other's score. Michael, a right hander, hefted his 12 pound ball and said he wasn't sure he was going to beat Darren, but he was going to give it a good shot. His coach/Dad Thomas told him he had the potential and talent to score well.

Michael started out with a turkey and decided this would be a good day. Soon he was on a roll, so to speak with six in a row. Now, he was feeling good. Michael was hopeful that he might beat his previous high game of 235 when he struck again. Now the realization dawned on him that he had a

really good game going. Michael was really into a positive mood with his ninth strike. Coming up to bowl his tenth frame, he was a little worried that he might throw a really terrible ball and the other kids would give him a bad time and tease him about not hitting the head pin. Michael struck in the tenth frame. Now, he was getting very nervous. The eleventh

strike happened, and then the final ball ended in a strike. Michael was stunned for just a moment, then proceeded to enjoy his accomplishment with high 5's from his teammates

Michael is now in the record books as the youngest bowler, (10 years, 3 months, and 16 days) to score a perfect game

He followed his 300 game with a nice 163 and 193 for a 656 series. Michael has a 165 average in the league. He nearly beat his previous high series of 658. This accomplishment from a kid, who has

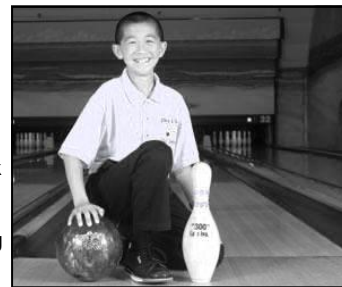
only been bowling in sanctioned leagues 4 years. He averaged 73 in his first year of bowling in 2002-03. He increased his average to 120 in 2003-04 and 154 in 2004-05.

Michael has been named a NorCal All Star for the past two years.

Michael is a good student in school and is known as the class clown for his sense of humor. He

also plays golf and hopes to play the sport for Stanford University. This unique athlete has a Brown/Black Belt in Hapkido Karate as well. Michael is a true role model for young people everywhere.

Michael was introduced to bowling by his mom, Traci when she would bring him with her when she bowled in her league. He wanted to try bowling so Traci brought him down to bowl while she worked on her game. Michael liked bowling the very first time he tried it as a six year old. The rest is history.

Tips for Using Microsoft Word

TIP #1:

In Microsoft Word, a *style* is a collection of commands and formats that have been bundled under one name. With styles, you don't have to visit a bunch of dialog boxes to change the formatting of text or paragraphs. Instead, you simply choose a style from the Styles and Formatting task pane or the Style drop-down list. You can be certain that all parts of the document that were assigned the same style look the same. In short, you can fool everybody into thinking your documents were created by a pro.

Which styles are available depends on which template you used to create your document. Each template comes with its own set of styles, and you can create your own styles, too.

A simple document created with the Normal template (a document that you created by clicking the New Blank Document button or pressing Ctrl+N) has but a few basic styles, but a document that was created with an advanced template comes with many styles.

To see which styles are available in the document you are working on, choose Format, Styles and Formatting or click the Styles and Formatting button to open the Styles and Formatting task pane. Want to know which style has been assigned to text or a paragraph? Click the text or paragraph and glance at the Style menu or the Styles and Formatting task pane.

TIP #2:

A nifty thing about the Replace command is that it tells you how many words it found and replaced when it's done. You can take advantage of that in a sneaky way to see how many times you use a certain word in your document.

As an example, you know that you use the word "actually" way too much. One or two "actuallys" are okay, but more than that and you're being repetitive.

To determine how many times you use "actually" (or any other word) in your document, summon the Find and Replace command and enter that word in *both* the Find What and Replace With boxes. The same word. Two times. Click Replace All, and Word dutifully counts

the instances of that word in your document.

Nothing is replaced with this trick because you're searching for a word and replacing it with the same word.

TIP #3:

It's quite possible to junk up your Word 2002 document with so many formatting commands that undoing them all would be a frustrating exercise. Rather than delete the text and start over, you can use a simple and universal undo-formatting command -- Word's equivalent of the text-formatting eraser. The command is Reset Character, and its short-cut key is Ctrl+Spacebar.

So, if you encounter an expanse of ugly and overly formatted text, select it as a block and press Ctrl+Spacebar. This key combination strips the formatting from the text like a powerful and environmentally unsafe industrial-sized can of paint remover. Bam! It's gone!

These tips work in Word 2002, unless otherwise stated, however they may work in other Microsoft Word program versions with a little modification.

Sarah & Anna. He is a general contractor and proprietor of Hoffmann Construction.

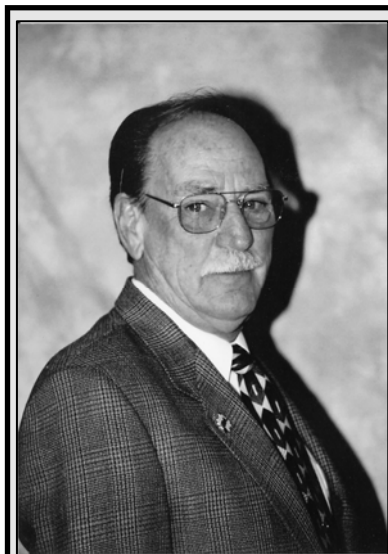

California USBC Association Elects New Board of Directors

On February 25, 2006 the delegates of the California Women's Bowling Association, California State Bowling Association and California State YABA officially voted to merge, pass State dues and elect a new Board of Directors who will take office on August 1, 2006.

First on the agenda was the approval of State Dues. After much discussion, \$1.00 was passed as the new State dues for all State Associations effective August 1, 2006.

The Bylaws were then approved and the meeting moved on to the Board elections.

Board applications were submitted to the State Nominating Committee by an extended deadline and then the Nominating Committee decided where on the ballot the candidate's name would be placed, regardless of what position an applicant applied for. Some delegates were confused by this because on a back table, made available to the delegates, were copies of the candidates' resumes. At the top of the resume was the "position desired" and it did not necessarily coincide with where the candidates' name was placed on the ballot.

There were 293 delegates eligible to vote. Those running for office were: President; Alfred Hoffmann, Linda Johnson and Marianne Evans (from the floor) and Alfred Hoffman was elected. First Vice President was Nancy Arvanitis and Linda Johnson (from the floor) and Linda was elected. Second Vice President was Lou Gillless, Marianne Evans and Nancy Arvanitis (from the floor)

and Nancy was elected. Third Vice President, a Youth Position, is Doug Lauer. Sergeant of Arms was Rosalie Parker and Bernie Rivers (from the floor) and Rosalie was elected.

There were two sets of Directors elected; four one year terms and four two year terms. This portion of the elections took quite a while because there were many names on the ballot as well as some who ran from the floor. For the sake of brevity, the following persons were elected as Directors: (two year term) Gina Moura, Larry Peppers, Paul Reynolds, Charles Shock, Melissa Ade, Judith Hartman, Phyl Knoll and Barbara Metzinger; (one year term) Mike Lucas, Bernie Rivers, Elaine Baker, Lynn Graves, Mabel Sheasley, Jeffrey Chin, Glenn Hizer and Robert Burton.

The eight positions elected by and from the California Youth Committee (CYC) are June Brown, Rose Brown, Cheryl Castro, Kim Decker, Georg Garrison, Don Lauer, Lynn Matsubara and Diddy Watts. These members were elected during the California USBC Youth Association Council of Delegates meeting in October 2005. Whew!

Since the elections took so much time, due to the number of nominees running for Directorships, the meeting room had to be relinquished back to the hotel and the meeting finished in the lobby. Keeping the meeting orderly was a bit of a challenge because the delegates had a difficult time hearing the chair's directions. Most folks either stood or sat on the floor for this historic conclusion of the meeting.
